100 Years of LWV

1920 - 2020

We believe in the power of women to create a more perfect democracy. That's been our vision since 1920, when the League of Women Voters was founded by leaders of the women's suffrage movement. For 100 years, we have been a nonpartisan, activist, grassroots organization that believes voters should play a critical role in democracy.

LEAGUE HISTORY

- LWV was founded on February 14th, 1920 in Chicago, IL
- Six months later, the 19th Amendment was ratified, giving women the right to vote
- The League of Women Voters of California was founded in 1921
- There are over 65 county groups within the CA state level
- The LWV Education Fund was established in 1957
- LWV launched Vote411.org in 2006 (In CA we have VotersEdge.com)
- Fair Maps campaign launched in 2019
- LWV celebrated 100 years in 2020

Our Goals:

The goal of the League of Women Voters is to empower citizens to shape better communities worldwide. The League of Women Voters is a nonpartisan political membership organization that:

- Acts after study and member agreement to achieve solutions In the public interest on key community issues at all government levels;
 - Builds citizen participation in the democratic process;
 - Engages communities in promoting positive solutions to public policy issues through education and advocacy.







NONPARTISANSHIP

- Nonpartisan, but Political
- We do not support or oppose political candidates or parties
- We advocate based on issues, not political parties
- We study issues, develop positions, and advocate for/against public policies

- Fighting Voter Suppression across the U.S.
- Electoral College Reform
- Getting big money out of politics: working on limiting SuperPACs & secret donors to protect representative democracy

- Board approves a statement and who will provide statement
