SEPTEMBER 14, 2021 CALIFORNIA GOVERNOR RECALL ELECTION



The California Governor Recall Election is on Tuesday, September 14. California voters will decide whether to recall the governor from office, and choose a replacement to be governor if the recall vote is successful.

Important Dates:

August 16, 2021: First day to vote by mail.

August 30, 2021: Registration deadline

September 14, 2021: Election Day

All California's active registered voters will receive a vote-by-mail ballot for the September 14, 2021 recall election. The deadline to register for the Recall Election is Monday, August 30, 2021.

What's on the ballot?

There will be two questions on the ballot that every eligible Californian can vote on:

1. **Do you want to recall the governor (remove him from office)?**
2. **If the governor is recalled, who do you want to replace him?**

If more than 50% of voters say "no" to the first question, the governor remains in office. If more than 50% of voters say "yes" to the first question, the person who gets the most votes on the second question becomes the governor. Answer both questions.

How do I find out about the candidates running to replace the governor?

Go to votersedge.org and put in your zip code. This LWV sponsored website will provide information on the candidates running to become governor in the event that the governor is recalled.

How do I vote in the Recall Election?

Every registered voter in California will receive a ballot in the mail, about a month before the Tuesday, September 14 Recall Election. Register to Vote at registertovote.ca.gov. Don't know if you're registered to vote? Visit voterstatus.sos.ca.gov to check your registration status or register to vote.

There are 3 ways to vote:

VOTE BY MAIL

You can fill it in and mail it back as soon as you receive it. No stamp? No problem. Mail your ballot back early because it must be postmarked by Election Day, Tuesday, September 14.

DROP OFF YOUR BALLOT

You can drop off your ballot at any voting location in your county. Some counties will also offer secure drop off locations. For details and locations check caearlyvoting.sos.ca.gov. If you decide to drop off your ballot, you must drop it off no later than 8PM on Election Day, September 14.

VOTE IN PERSON

Your voting location may be different this year. In certain counties you can vote at any voting location. In other counties you must visit a special assigned voting location. Early voting, starting before Election Day, will be available in some locations.

At in-person voting locations you can:

- Vote in person.
- Drop off your completed ballot.
- Vote with an accessible voting machine.
- Get help and voting materials in multiple languages.

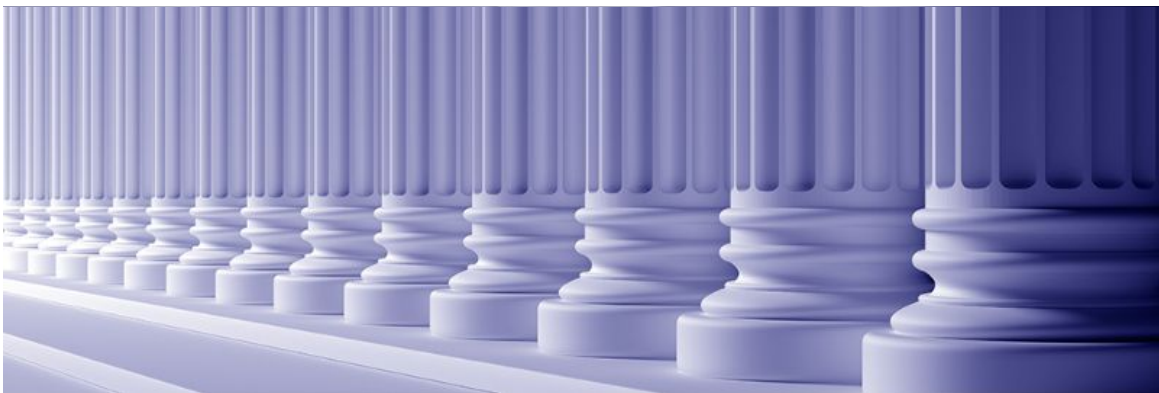

Democracy Doesn't Save Itself

You get it. You recognize that democracy is fragile and you joined the LWV to help protect it.

In order to inoculate our society from misinformation and conspiracy theories, we need informed people armed with the facts and evidence to block the chain of transmission of misinformation. This is especially crucial in local politics due to the collapse of local newspapers and the dearth of non-

partisan and analytical information.

Now what? How do you take the next step and get involved with the work?

There is a level of league for each level of government. You joined LWVBC, which means you are automatically a member of LWV LA County, LWV California and LWVUS.

If your passion is local governance, then become an observer of local government meetings and/or join one of LWVBC interest groups: Education, Housing/Homelessness, Social Policy/Aging, Water/Infrastructure. Sign up for the email list for one or more of the interest groups and attend when you can/wish.

If you are looking for community, we hold monthly book club meetings and agenda-less socials. Even if you haven't read the book, come for the discussion on the book topic and learn with us. Come to the socials and make some new friends.

If you are interested in issues at the County, State or National level, contact them to be added to the email list and to get invited to the meetings (almost all held virtually). The LWVC Issues page shows all the areas we are involved in and contact info. They can also refer you to LWV at another level. LWVBC has several groups working in Government (Redistricting, Voter Services), Social Policy (Education, Health & Wellness, Housing and Homelessness) and one in Natural Resources. All of our groups would welcome new members. If you want to start another group, let the president know.

If you have the time and interest, come to board meetings even if you are not a member of the board. At our monthly board meetings, we plan educational programming and discuss policy goals and local issues that may require LWV advocacy action. If you see a local issue that needs addressing, please bring it to the board president, advocacy chair, and any board members who cover the area. Our names, contact info, and portfolio assignments are in the LWVBC directory. For instance, I cover the Natural Resources portfolio at both the local and county levels, which includes air, water, pollution, transportation, and climate change. It overlaps greatly with Teri Neustaedter's portfolio of Housing and Homelessness through land-use and zoning.

If you have special skills, volunteer to work off-board on specific issues. Speak a language other than English? Law? Contracts? GIS? Science? Data Analysis? Communication? Investigative journalism? Education? Medicine? Let us know because we often need off-board help when issues arise.

WE NEED YOU: OBSERVER CORPS!

Share the position with one or more interested people.

WHY: Our City Council meetings are an important part of how our cities support, protect and enrich our lives.

- The first reason for observing public meetings is to watch their general operations. What issues are being discussed and how is the meeting being conducted? Does the agency comply with the open meeting laws?
- The second reason for observing public meetings is to watch for issues on which the League should be taking action - speaking out. If an item that is being discussed is related to one of LWVC's positions then include that in your report. We'll look into it and see whether it's something that the League should be speaking out on.
- Finally, and maybe most importantly, observing makes a statement that the community is watching the process of government. The League observer is the representative of the public at these.

WHAT: Attend or watch a city council meeting and share important information. We would like all of our cities represented/observed for every city council meeting.

- Go to the meeting. Get a copy of the agenda (if possible, check whether it is available in advance online) and any other reports that are available. You don't have to read them all! You may not speak for the League at the meeting. Outside of the meeting you can ask questions of staff and officials.
- If you can't be at the meeting in person, then watch it online. While the officials may not see you, you can still monitor the meeting.

WHO: Anyone who lives in the South Bay and is a member of the League of Women's Voters of the Beach Cities. Share the work with someone else. We already have one observer for Redondo Beach and one for Hermosa Beach.

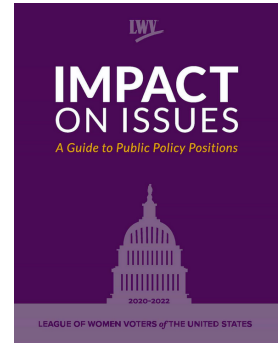
