

# **Measure W: Expectations vs Reality**

In the recent rains, many lamented the water running into the ocean as "wasted". In 2018, LA County voters approved a tax on impervious surfaces to fund stormwater capture. The <u>LA Times touched on a few of the reasons why progress is so slow.</u>

Some environmental groups have added up the precipitation that falls in LA County, divided by consumption, and inferred that all we have to do is just catch it all. It's not that simple. There's a mismatch between what people thought they were voting for and what they are getting. The LA Times article laments that "only 30 acres of new green space have been added under the program, the report found. Los Angeles County spans about 3 million acres".

We reached out to LA County to hear their side of the story. On May 11, 2023, Kirk Allen, Senior Civil Engineer, LA County Public Works Stormwater Planning Division, gave an overview and progress report on the Safe Clean Water Program (Measure W) to the Water & Infrastructure Group (monthly WIG Zoom meeting).

We learned the history of how Measure W was crafted to gain the broad political support necessary for passage. A key feature of Measure W is that multi-benefit projects that advance multiple aims score highest in funding priority. Nature-based solutions and projects in disadvantaged communities also score more highly.

I poked around the <u>LA County Measure W accountability map</u> to learn more. I read the Project Descriptions for several projects to learn more and will highlight some of the difficulties for selected projects.

See the pictures after the jump for expectations vs reality. Stormwater capture means catching, cleaning and storing precipitation; it is not a parks or green space program but projects include some greening wherever possible.

Stormwater capture does not mean the water is saved for potable use. It means that it is held back for cleanup and eventual release either to the environment or to wastewater treatment plants capable of recycling it to potable standards. Treated wastewater can be safely stored in aguifers for eventual potable use.


